Group Leader Report 2025

To start the leaders need a big thank you for their commitment in delivering the Scouting programme. This programme allows the young people to have fun, adventure and hopefully a bit of education thrown in the mix. This isn't just for the young people the idea of Scouting is that the leaders get this as well. We need more volunteers to help us deliver the programme to more young people whilst taking the pressure off the current teams.

This year we have expanded the helper team but we are still looking for more regular team members to help in particular the Cub section who need the support of a team leader to coordinate with the other team members. Martina has had her first year of running the Scout section as team leader with outdoor pursuits at the forefront of their activities.

Our current project is based around energy efficiency and making our hall "greener". We were successful in obtaining a grant to support having a professional survey done. Apart from some physical upgrades relating to insulation the main part of this relates to our heating system which apart from repair and servicing has been here since 1982. Having our own hall and keeping it in reasonable working order allows us to rent it as a community space raising money from hire charges. We have several regular hirers plus of course the one off hires for parties etc. Part of this requires time by the Trustee board and Leaders to help with viewing for potential hirers and opening and closing the hall for some of our bookings. We are looking for new Trustees with one person to take over the Hall Manager role. No actual Scouting background is necessary but some management and organisational skills would help. It is an important role as it's our main source of income and helps to keep the cost of Scouting to a minimum.

After 10 years I am stepping back as Group Leader but will remain involved with the Trustees. Rob who has assisted me in the past plus has been Cub section and Scout section team leader will be taking over.
